THE MOUNTAIN SCHOOL

The Mountain School house was built in 1872 by John Plotts and Justin Rogers. It was located on the farm now owned by Ward Birdsall.

ELK CREEK SCHOOL

The Elk Creek School was located between the wooden covered bridge which spans the Loyalsock creek about three miles above Hillsgrove and what was then the Snell grist mill. The mill is now owned by the M. W. Lewis family. No records can be found to determine when this building was erected. Mr. Justin Rogers attended school there from 1861 to 1867. Some of his schoolmates were Eleanore Rogers, Frank Rogers, Clinton Vroman, Lettie Vroman, Henry Vroman, George Lewis, Hiram Osler, Cole Snell, Rachel Snell. Some of the early teachers were: Anna Plotts, December 1865 to March 1866; Mary L. Norton, December 1867 to March 1868; Marion Rogers, June 1870 to September 1870. The school terms at that time were much shorter than at the present time and the salaries were as low as \$15.00 a month. The teachers boarded around among their pupils, thus saving a boardbill which they probably would have been unable to pay. Others teaching in the Elk Creek School were: Ursaline Green, Alice Wilcox, Alice Kline, Sarah J. Snell and Sadie Snell. Miss Sadie Snell, later Mrs. Joseph Morgan, was the last to teach in that building. She taught from June 24, 1878 to September of the same year.
