The dictionary gives me a word meaning—uprightness; virtue; honesty; justice; soundness; completeness and the word that comprehends all this and more is the little word integrity. The soul of Robert Mc-Ewen is with God, his integrity is stamped upon the lives of his working men and business associates and will send its influence in shining rays of truth down the vistas of the future when his name is forgotten, but he will live in the memory of generations vet to be in the valley of the 'Sock who, through the memory of their sires will see him, the stalwart, robust, pioneer that shared the joys and sorrows of his fellow workers.

With such powers as I have I would make a word picture of Robert McEwen, public benefactor and man among men, knowing that my effort will become a mere outline to those reading these lines, who knew the real man.

Sixty-six years of his life were spent lumbering in the Keystone state, twenty-five years on the 'Sock and its branches.

A youth of nineteen, at his birth place on his father's farm in St. Telisphore, Quebec, Canada. He heard the call too strong to be resisted, and set, out for the states, arriving in Williamsport in the fall of 1865, starting as a laborer on the old Dodge mill. Gaining experience in rafting and driving logs on the Susquehanna river, he spent some time working in the woods in Clearfield county, at the age of twenty four establishing himself as an inde-
