Dear Brother Philip

I will try and write a few lines to you hoping it will find you all well as it-leave us we are having nice weather here at present the temperature starts at 75 this afternoon we have started to sow Barley the ground is in good condition the grain market is the worst I have seen in along time we sold five thousand Bushels of Barley lately for 40 cts a bushel it should have brought 50 c we have not shelled any

Can get it - is away down
 from what it ought to be
 wheat is below a Dollar
 in Kansas City

Well times sure have
 changed - Just 50 years ago
 this winter I was at
 Thornedale loading teams
 for 90¢ a day and paid 45¢
 a day for Board out of
 the 90¢ to day if a man
 could make four Dollars a
 day out here he will
 not work some made
 seven Dollars a day shoveling
 can hear this winter and
 they thought they ought
 to make more

well I am hear a lone
 to Day Anna and Chester
 went over to Freds
 and the other Bays went
 to the Smokey Garden
 to Kate & Hans mat-
 hat no letter from
 Rosa for a long time
 I am sure she was one
 a letter I dont suppose
 Maria will ever write
 to me a gain
 the wheat fields begin
 to look Green hear now
 Kansas seems to have
 a good Prospekt for a
 good wheat crop this
 year
